

ANACONDA GARDEN CLUB: Norm DeNeal, President

Their meetings are held at the Haufbrau at 11:30 with a luncheon before the business begins. Some of their projects include a Holiday Show in November. This is one of their most successful fundraisers, over \$5,000! This year, after the show ended, they

dismantled four vintage scenes, depicting Christmas in the 20's and 30's, and moved the displays into windows of the Montana Hotel for passers- by to view. Their Christmas Party in December included entertainment from the Anaconda High School Choir and 12 ladies from a Zumba Exercise Dance group. With Anaconda's fundraising, they are able to award two \$1,000 scholarships and two \$500 scholarships to Anaconda High School graduates. Once every two weeks during the summer the club will sell items they have made during the Farmer's Market.

At their October meeting, she demonstrated pumpkin decorating and carving. In November the Montana Natural Medicine organization put on a program explaining the positive effects of Medicinal Marijuana and the rules and regulations that go along with it. 

Just paper clip the three pages together and send them to me.

B-8 is the Circle of Green Thumbs award. Nominate one person from each club


B-9 is Gardener of the Year and worth \$100

C-4 is Garden Club Member of the year and they get the tiara for a year.

B-12 is the Mary Lee Award and can go to an individual for an artistic expression of flowers, such as a painting, quilt, hand-made flower craft, excluding photography. Entries must be submitted in digital format.
