

Ecological Landscaping

My lawn has always been a far cry from perfection and generally doesn't even fit the category of "aesthetically pleasing." We are always combating one extreme or another - harsh winters, dry summers, poor soil and weeds. Just getting sod rolled out seemed like a narrow fix. My husband and I started thinking, "Are there other options that are more 'green'?"

When I think of lawn in its native setting, I think of the mild climates of northern Europe and green grass, rolling hills and white woolly sheep dotting the expanse. This native grass grew with adequate rainfall and mild climates. There was very little cultivation from man-kind and the "lawnmowers" were sheep who kept the growing grass in check. Over the years wealthy landowwners modernized grasses and added them to grand manicured gardens.

So, flashback to modern-day America. We live in a country with a vast array of opposing climates. Time, money, and in most cases, toxic chemicals are used on the implementation and upkeep of flora species that makes no ecological sense for the climatically diverse landscape of the United States.

According to the EPA, garden equipment contributes 5% of the nation's air pollution - 800 million gallons burned annually. But, before emissions have a chance to be released in the air, more than 17 million gallons of fuel are spilled each year refueling equipment - that's nearly double the oil spilled from the Exxon Valdez. In terms of water use, about 50-70% of residential water is used for landscaping, totalling 20-30 million acres in the US. Need more convincing? How about nearly 70 million tons of active pesticide and fertilizers applied to lawns each year. This is 10 times the amount used per acre by farmers. Now, with all the water runoff, those pesticides move to water bodies where 96% of fish now contain a detectable level of at least one pesticide.

So what can we do to make a change to these statistics? Smaller lawn areas and changes including a push mower, planning for more effictive watering and reduction of fertilizers and pesticides. Another movement in the battle against traditional lawn is Xeriscaping or native landscaping which involves substituting traditional lawn with more sensible solutions based on the region. Here are several alternatives to traditional grass:

- Thyme fragrant, drought tolerant but slow spreading
- Creeping Jenny eye-catching groundcover, very aggressive
- Buffalo grass like turf grass, but less water and mowing
- Dutch white clover nitrogen fixing, but can't handle traffic
- Sedums spread quickly and outcompete neighboring weeds
- Mazus good in shady spots but prefer slightly moist soil

Single massings of these plants can be mixed and matched for a lawn to take on a quilt-like or mosaic pattern.

For me it was a clear decision to stay away from a traditional lawn. We now employ compost and chicken manure as fertilizer, native plantings, an old push mower to trim where possible and future use of rainwater cisterns and grey water for irrigation. Look around your yard. Are there areas where lawn doen't make sense? I challenge you to consider one small change as you plan for the future. As a former college professor put it, "If you don't need a moat, you don't need a lawn."

ESTHER HAMELPasses Away in Florida

Former MFGC President Esther Vera Mae Knopp Hamel, 92, of Punta G orda, Florida, and formerly of St. Ignatius, died Sunday, Sept. 21, 2014, at the Palms of Punta Gorda retirement home. She experienced a stroke in May 2011 and never fully recovered from it.



Esther was born May 20, 1922, at the family homestead near Circle to Frank Knopp and Kathrine Malhstedt. Her mother died in 1930 and Frank married Pauline Lofts in 1933. The homestead was lost to drought and the family moved to Pablo and Ronan, where Esther graduated from high school.

Esther married Robert J. Hamel of St. Ignatius on March 16, 1941, in Las Vegas. They made their first home in Los Angeles, where Robert worked for Vultee Aircraft as a draftsman. After his father's illness in 1942, they moved back to St. Ignatius, formed Chalimar Farm and began ranching, raising their two children, Kathryn Dee and Dennis Robert.

Esther didn't receive any higher education, but she was self-taught in a variety of fields. She received 15 local and national honors and wrote 12 books on various subjects. She was a local and national flower show judge and chairman for more than 20 years. She was an accomplished seamstress and made her clothing with hats to match. Esther also loved wigs in every color and style to match an outfit, often confusing people to think that Robert had a new wife.

Robert died Jan. 20, 1996, the year they would have celebrated 55 years of marriage. Esther bought a lot in Florida in 1997 and began subdividing the farm to ultimately have her dream house built down the street from adopted son David in Florida. She enjoyed her Florida home for 13 years until declining health moved her to independent living.

She is survived by her sisters, Joy Knopp Des Rosier of Whitehall and Florence Knopp Hayden of Florence; daughter, Kay Hamel Kelly of St. Ignatius; adopted son, David Alligood; and friend, Ray Bailey of Florida. She also leaves behind two grandsons, a granddaughter and five great-grandchildren.

A celebration of Esther's life will be held in St. Ignatius, Montana in the spring of 2015.

Quorum and Standing Rules: Parliamentarian Darlene Skari declared a quorum and reviewed the standing rules of Parliamentary Procedure

Committee to Approve Minutes of 2014 Fall Board: Joyce Hendricks, Sharon Miller, and Pat Biggs

Treasurer's Report: Glenna presented the Mid-year Financial Report and moved to have it accepted as printed, Motion carried.

Nominating Committee Report: Phyllis moved that Linda Hill Sadler be the 2015 - 2017 MFGC President, Motion carried. She will contact Club Presidents to submit names of members interested in filling these positions: Treasurer, Recording Secretary, and 2nd Vice-President. The Committee's slate of candidates will be voted upon at Convention 2015.

Workshop One: Susan Billmayer led a hands-on workshop using the "Armiture" Design, the latest design from National. Natural plant materials are woven, braided, bundled, bound, etc. to achieve spectacular floral designs. Some remarkable designs were produced in such a short period of time.

MFGC Officer Reports:

President Denise Fink pointed out that National will collect \$1 per member starting 2016; \$.50 per member has been the National's compensation for many years. MFGC will not raise its dues, and prefers to buffer the shortfall with fund raising projects, such as "Vision of Beauty" Calendars, Big Sky Star notices for \$5 in the *Montana Gardens*, etc. Denise encouraged everyone to contribute to our fundraisers in order to avoid and future increase in dues. gardens – Winter 2014

President-elect Linda Sadler has selected a "Thumbs-Up for Gardening—Educate, Engage, and Enjoy" theme for her presidency. The schedule for District Meetings in 2015 was distributed. Linda walked us through the process of completing an award, pointing our attention to how easy it was to prepare/submit an award and how little time it really takes.

2nd VP Joyce Hendricks stated that the NGC President's Special Project application promoting choices when impacting the environment and the health of our planet is due March 15. Any clubs working on these areas should apply; the first place prize is \$200. Applications are available through our website.

Recording Secretary Lynne Mahan has concerns about undated revisions of minutes can result in confusion and time-consuming misinformation.

Corresponding Secretary Jim Sadler relinquished his presentation in the interests of time constraints.

MFGC Chairman Reports:

Member Services: Carol Works reported that Linda Sadler is the newest NGC Life member. She urged Clubs to apply for the Community Garden Tools grant (See The *National Gardener*, Fall issue 2014, p. 17). NGC has recently partnered with Ames Company, Inc., which is the largest U.S. manufacturer of gardening tools, and the winning grant gets a complete set of tools.

Workshop Two: Darlene Skari wrote a skit of a typical small garden club meeting where Robert's Rules were not followed and the repercussions thereof.

Blue Star Memorial Marker: The Sage and Roses program is a drawing where dollar donations earn chances for one State to win a Marker. Chairman Kathy Austin suggested that instead of sending cards/memorials to Garden Club members, a donation be made to Sage and Roses and increase the chance of a free Blue Star Marker in Montana.

New MFGC Award: Lynne Mahan read the following motion for approval:

Number B-12, entitled Mary Lee Award, in the amount of \$20 annually sponsored by the Whitehall Garden Club. The award will go to an individual, any size club, to reward artistic expression of flowers, such as a painting, quilt, or hand-made flower craft (no photos). Entries must be submitted in digital format.

MFGC Chairman Reports: (continued)

Unfinished Business:

Motion for Correction to Fall Board 2013 Minutes: Norm DeNeal entertained a Motion for Correction to read: "MFGC Policies and Procedures do not need to be posted in the *Montana Gardens* but are voted on by the Board of Directors." Motion for Correction approved.

Approval of Fall Board 2013 Minutes: Denise called for a motion to approve the corrected Fall Board 2013 Minutes. Motion approved.

Approval of MFGC Meeting Minutes: Darlene reminded us that Linda Nelson, National President, clarified the approval of our meeting minutes: Fall Board minutes are approved at the regular meeting of the next year's Fall Board; Convention minutes are approved at the regular meeting of the next year's Convention.

Flower Show School: Susan Billmayer reported a very successful July Flower Show Symposium in Great Falls with 29 attendees. Joyce Hendricks became an Accredited Judge in September. Any interested members wanting to become a Judge should contact Susan. She encouraged Clubs to host a Standard Flower Show.

State Credentials: Susan Billmayer briefed us on the current Judge credentials for Montana: 6 Emeritus, 16 Master, 6 Life, 7 Judges, 3 Student Judges. Cheryl Carroll and Luana Maxwell became Master Judges after the Symposium. Diana May completed a Second Refresher, Denise Fink elevated to a Life Judge, and 5 Life Judges took their First Refresher course.

Workshop Three: Pat Biggs encouraged us to review our meeting programs and practice "Putting Fun in Garden Clubs." Member surveys reveal that Montana members want short, organized meetings. A handout was distributed outlining the basics of interesting meetings. Members enjoyed a "handbag scavenger hunt." The audience divided into two groups and raided each other's purses for scavenger hunt items. This activity illuminates how much fun we can have working together.

Workshop Four: Sharon Miller, Club Yearbooks Chairman, distributed the Guidelines sheet for yearbook submissions, which contains a scale of points for each item required.

Native Plants/Wildflowers: Sue Leferink designed and installed 250 square feet of Certified Wildlife Demonstration gardens at Montana Wild in Helena. Sue added 20 new species this year and acquires some of her

seeds/plants from the Montana Conservation Seedling Nursery (www.dnrc.mt.gov/forestry/nursery) in Missoula. All species are native to Montana and are available at little or no cost to any interested party.

Crown Bees: Sue Leferink, Chairman, gave presentations on attracting and creating habitat for native bees and has established a public native bee habitat garden at the Montana Wild Education center in Helena. Four MFGC members have agreed to help Sue "spread the word" on native bees: Connie Leatherman, Townsend; Jo Lee Burman, Dearborn; Mary Baughn, Stevensville, and Betsy Heckel, Belgrade. Sue provides all speaking/educational materials and serves as an informational source.

Workshop Five: Sue Leferink introduced an innovative concept taking Permaculture to the next level: Edible Forest Gardening based on the books by Dave Jacke and Eric Toensmeier. Modeling after the self-sustaining ecosystem of a forests, it combines agricultural concepts with a forest ecosystem. It requires an understanding of the relationships between the air, water, land, plants and other organisms and how the layers of a forest work together. The main goal is to achieve a low maintenance, sustainable food forest garden with minimal waste and disturbance to our environment. The first public food forest garden is being planted in Seattle, WA. The Helena community will be breaking ground on the first food forest in Montana next spring. WATER...DID YOU KNOW?

- 70% of the earth's surface is water; 75% of the human body; and 90% of human blood is water. Of all the water there is on earth, 97% is in seas and oceans and 2% is in ice caps. Of the remaining 1% fresh water, only a small percentage is accessible. And from what's accessible, 98% is used for agriculture and industry.
- —Water's necessity does not end with humans. In fact, water is the quintessential part of most living organisms. Even plants need water. There is more animal and plant life found in water than on land and in the air collectively.
- For humans, water is so important because it's used in so many activities. We need to drink water to survive and stay healthy. We need water for bathing, cleaning and washing. We need water for cooking. Water is in the form of milk, fruits, meats, vegetables, and even in stones.
- Water is the most common substance on earth, however only 1% of the earth's water is available for drinking.
- 66% (two-thirds) of the human body is water.
- A cow must drink 3 gallons of water to make 1 gallon of milk. 75% of a tree is water. 70% of an elephant is water.
- You can survive about three weeks without food, but only 3 days without water.
- It takes 50 glasses of water to grow enough oranges to make 1 glass of orange juice. A tomato is 95% water An ear of corn is 80% water.
- Rivers and streams make up 3.5 million miles. Lakes cover 41 million acres
- The average daily requirement for freshwater in the United States is about 338 billion gallons.
- If the Earth were completely flat, it would be covered by water 2 miles deep!
- One gallon of gasoline can contaminate 750,000 gallons of water.
- We use about 108 gallons of water per person per day in our homes.


