MONTANA WILDFLOWER GLACIER LILIES



Glacier Lily - Erythronium Grandiflora is a member of the Lily family (Liliaceae). Some common names are Snow Lily, Dog Tooth Violet or Trout Lily. It grows in moist rich sites either shaded or open from foothills to alpine sites. It is often found near melting snow and with spring beauty. It blooms between March and August (depending on elevation).

This perennial herb grows 4-12 inches tall with one palr of basal leaves that are 4-8 inches long. The flowers are bright yellow and nodding. The six petals are curved upward and six large brown stamens project downward. The corms are edible but sweeter when cooked. Bears and rodents eat the corms and numerous animals eat the seed pods.



MONTANA BUTTERFLIES

KATHLEEN WATERS, Chairman Butterflies and Habitats

With over 147,000 square miles, Montana has sufficient land mass to host an incredible two hundred butterfly species. That's a large number for a northern state. With close to three dozen National Wildlife Refuges and National Parks and about four dozen Montana State Parks, there's always an opportunity to take a hike and see the butterflies. You can call ahead to see if the park has a butterfly checklist. For example, the Lee Metcalf National Wildlife Refuge located south of Missoula has a fifty species checklist. Also, don't forget to watch along city streets, city parks and especially in your own yard!

Lepidoptera (moths and butterflies) is the second largest order in the class Insecta. It includes Nymphalidae (brushfooted butterflies), Danaidae (milkweed butterflies), Pieridae (whites and sulfurs), Papilionidae (swallowtails), Lycaenidae (blues, coppers, and hairstreaks) and Hesperiidae (skippers).

Montana's State Butterfly (pictured top left) is the Mourning Cloak. They are easily recognizable by their purple/black wings with yellow edges and small blue spots. A brushfooted butterfly, Mourning Cloaks overwinter as adults, taking shelter in a hole in a tree or under some bark to wait out the winter. The Mourning Cloak butterflies are among the longest living adult butterflies in the world. They can live for up to 10 months. When they emerge in the spring, this trait gives them a head start over the other butterflies for finding food and a mate.


The larvae of Mourning Cloaks prefer elm and willow trees and can most often be found near them. The caterpillars eat the leaves of these trees. As adults they eat some nectar, but their main source of food is tree sap. They can also obtain some nutrients from mud puddles and animal dung.

Nearly all Lepidopteran larvae are called caterpillars. They have a well-developed head with chewing mouthparts. In addition to three pairs of legs on the thorax, they have two to eight pairs of fleshy abdominal prolegs that are structurally different from the thoracic legs. Most Lepidopteran larvae are herbivores; some species eat foliage, some burrow into stems or roots, and some are leaf-miners. Butterflies are diurnal (active during the day), brightly colored, and have knobs or hooks at the tip of the antennae. At rest, the wings are held vertically over the body.

In contrast, most (but not all) moths are nocturnal. They are typically drab in appearance, and have thread-like, spindle-like, or comb-like antennae. At rest, their wings are held horizontally against the substrate, folded flat over the back, or curled around the body. Two moths of note are the Sphinx moth and the Hummingbird moth.

There are many different creatures that make butterflies part of their diet. Some common predators of butterflies include wasps, ants, parasitic flies, birds, snakes, toads, rats, lizards, dragonflies, frogs and spiders. These predators eat butterflies as butterfly eggs, caterpillars and adult butterflies. Some butterflies such as the Monarch eat poisonous plants (milkweeds) as larvae to discourage predators.

So, if you are a caterpillar or butterfly, how do you keep from getting eaten? One great way is to have fake eyes to trick predators into thinking you are something else!



While there may be a lot of different butterfly nectar plants available, the top three nectar bearing food plants that butterflies love are butterfly weed, purple coneflowers and the New England Aster! One of the things to keep in mind when you are attempting to attract butterflies to your backyard is that you need to have a lot of different flowers for them to choose from. This way, you will definitely be attracting more than one type of butterfly. Remember that big butterflies like tall flowers and small butterflies like short flowers. Be sure to group the same types of flowers together. You will attract more butterflies than if you scatter your flowers throughout the garden.

A great addition to any butterfly garden is at least one rock, this gives a great place for all of the butterflies to stop and rest their wings. Also, butterflies are cold-blooded and will benefit from a sunny rock to warm themselves up in the mornings. A small puddle or muddy spot will attract male butterflies. They draw nutrients from mud that they pass on to the female when they mate.

Certain plants attract certain butterflies: Monarch – Milkweed; Black Swallowtail – Carrots , Rue , Parsley , Dill , Fennel; Tiger Swallowtail – Wild Cherry , Birch , Ash , Poplar , Apple Trees , Tulip Trees , Sycamore; Pipevine Swallowtail – Dutchman's Pipe; Great Spangled Fritillary – Violet; Buckeye – Snapdragon; Mourning Cloak – Willow , Elm; Viceroy – Pussy Willow , Plums , Cherry; Red Spotted Purple – Willow , Poplar; Pearl Crescent, Silvery Checkerspot – Aster.

POLLINATORS WELCOME

As you stroll through the yard, there flits a butterfly moving on to the next flower. Do you still get excited as you did when you were a child? Pollinators including the bees and the butterflies don't seem to be as abundant as they were when we were children. The most probable cause is habitat loss, misuse of pesticides and disease. We can do our part by planting to attract them to our yards. Not only are we bringing the "awe" back to our flower beds, but pollination is needed for over 150 food crops in the United States.

Plant a rainbow of colors to attract the bees, butterflies and hummingbirds. Blue, yellow, white and purple colors attract bees, and butterflies prefer red and purple tones. Salvia, Mexican Sunflower, Yarrow, Lavender, Trailing Rosemary, Nasturtium, Verbena, Zinnia, Aster, Golden Rod, Scabiosa, Bachelor Buttons, Butterfly Weed, Blazing Star Liatris and Butterfly Bush are plants to encourage the butterflies to visit your yard. These blooms offer a variety of shapes and sizes and bloom at different times during the season.





Bees especially are attracted to Bee Balm, Purple Coneflower, Calendula, Marigolds, Cosmos, Heliotrope, Sunflowers, Echinacea, Oregano, Dill, Mint, Sunflower, Raspberry Sedum and Joe-Pye Weed. Consider letting your herbs bloom to attract the bees. Plant in clusters of three to five to create a drift in your flower bed. Bees and butterflies tend to be near sighted and can best find your flowers when planted in clusters.

Liatris, Purple Coneflower, Milkweed, Coreoposis, and the California Poppy are native plants that are a great addition to attract pollinators. Shrubs like Viburnum, Butterfly Bush, Spirea, and Summersweet offer a treat as well as a Crabapple Tree.

Pollinators need water so place a shallow bird bath, fountain or pond amongst the flowers.

As you plan for summer blooms, plan to plant a variety of colors and shapes to attract a variety of pollinators. Choose plants that flower at different times providing a nectar and pollen source throughout the growing season. Plant in clumps rather than single plants to better attract pollinators.

I share pollinator articles and invite others to share how to welcome the pollinators. I participate on FaceBook with the Pollinator's Welcome Group. Please join us as we communicate with one another!

I cleaned the front beds; placed about three inches of Soil Pep (a mulch made up of composed bark) around the tulips that are emerging. I always fertilize early in the Spring as it gives the bulbs a good boost. I like the pelletized fertilizers. All of the major fertilizer makers have very similar products. I look at the formula on the package and choose the one with the highest phosphorus. Cost of course is also a consideration.

I have staged the front border with a white theme. My absolute favorite tulip is Maureen, a very stately and tall white giant Darwin Hybrid. The flowers are huge, with strong-stemmed flowers. They bloom late April into May here in Missoula. Their height is 20-22 inches. Catherina is a creamy-white with broad, ivory-white petals and a buttercup-yellow interior base and dark yellow anthers. It is about 24 to 26 high and blooms in May. Another tulip is a White Triumphator. It is an old favorite and has been around a long time. It is a lily flowering type, is 24" high and mid to late May bloomer.

To give variety I plant Stainless a late flowering, ivory-white daffodil. And of course, Mount Hood, a white heirloom that turns glistening ivory white as the long-lasting blooms mature.

The reason why I am telling you about my white border is that I have several secrets that I am willing to share. First of all, the border is very hot in the summer and being beside the road is difficult to keep watered. I early on made the decision to plant only for spring and thus allowing the bulbs to dry up naturally. I only add a few annuals like white sweet alyssum and white petunias by the gate. By allowing my bulb bed to dry out I have a marvelous bonus. About every three years, or whenever I get around to it, I dig the tulips. Because I put each variety in its own row, I can easily keep them separate. I dig soon after the last tulip has started to wither. I place the whole bulb stem and green leaves in a paper bag. I always take off the seed bod. I write on the bag the variety and place in the garage until fall. In the fall, I find that a good majority of the bulbs have split into three bulbs. I separate out the large bulbs for replanting in the display garden. The smaller bulbs are placed someplace else in the gardens in back of the house to increase in size.

I generally do not fuss with the daffodils, if I dig them, I replant them right away. The benefit of digging and drying out the tulips is that I have increased my tulip display immensely. When you consider each tulip is worth from 89 cents to a dollar apiece it is well worth the trouble. You can tell when it is time to dig your tulips when they have formed clumps. Leaving them in the clumps will weaken the tulip and the bloom will not be as expected. I always plant my tulips deeper than the directions by a few inches. At the bottom of the hole I put a sprinkling of a dried fertilizer. Water well and in the Spring, you will have tulips that look just like they do in the seed catalogues.

MONTANA FEDERATION OF GARDEN CLUBS, INC. ENDOWMENT INTEREST GRANT GUIDELINES

The Endowment Program of the Montana Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. provides grants for projects by local federated garden clubs in the State of Montana. The Endowment Program has been making annual grants since 2015. These guidelines were written June 21, 2019.

Eligibility Project must:

- Be charitable in purpose
- Have able and committed leadership

Ineligible Projects:

- Conferences
- Planning, research or untested projects
- Partisan or sectarian activities

About the Grants

- Grants will be up to \$500
- Grants must be used for projects benefiting communities or residents of Montana
- Grant requests are reviewed by the Executive Committee and the Endowment Committee of the Montana Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc.
- Incomplete applications will not be considered

Preferred Projects

- Priority will be given to projects that meet the following criteria:
 - Provide a long-term, direct benefit to local residents or community
 - Enjoy support from community members
 - Projects have an ongoing, sustainable funding source
 - Address important, unmet needs

Cash Match - Cash match is required for the grants

For every five dollars of grant funding, applicants must have at least one dollar of matching funds for the project.

Cash must be either pledged or in-hand. Please include some form of evidence of cash match such as a letter of commitment or a copy of a donation received.

Cash Match (*continued*)

In-kind match (such as committed materials, real estate, building, donated time or other good or service) is valuable and shows the importance of the project to the community. Please describe any in-kind match committed to the project.

Application Package Checklist Please include all of the following items in your application:

- MFGC's Endowment Interest Grant Application Cover Sheet (attached)
- Project budget including a description of cash and in-kind match and proof that cash and inkind match is committed to the project.
- Copy of 501(c)3 if your organization has this designation
- A description of the Club organization including what it does in the community, who your organization serves, and a list of board members and/or project leaders.
- A written description of the proposed project, in two pages or less, to include the following:
 - A detailed description of the proposed project
 - Explanation of how the project meets the Montana Federation of Garden Club's funding priorities:
 - Describe the impact of the project in the community
 - Estimate how many people will benefit from this project

I start out in the morning on frozen ground. Then by noon I am up to my ankles in mud. A day later it snows three to four inches and after the snow melts I'm right back up to my angles in mud. However, we need this valuable moisture. winter wheat nearly blew away with the high winds this winter. The moisture and warm sun now has perked it into growing. Without that winter wheat holding onto the ground I'm afraid most of my rich topsoil would have blown into Great Falls.

Be patient. This virus. like our Montana wind, will soon blow over. And, like the high wind damage, there will be things in our lives that may need to be replaced. Please stay safe. Be mindful of our newly imposed sanctions so that we can help put an end to the spread of this terrible virus and get back to a normal life as we know it.
