Zoom has invaded my life in ways that I never could have predicted. I work for a company that is headquartered in Maryland, my boss is in California and I am recruiting people in Montana, North Dakota and South Dakota all on the phone with Zoom interviews. The most interesting use of Zoom has been the seminars I have attended studying "How to Judge Roses in Photography"; "Judging Old World Roses" and "Rose Diseases and Cures in the Northwest". What an opportunity to promote our mission right in front of us. If we keep it short and limit it to an hour, we could have several designers share their arrangements. right tree, how to plant it and how to nurture it. You can structure your own project to educate not only your members, but the members of your community as a whole.



WILDFLOWER REPORT

SUSAN ANDREWS MFGC WILDFLOWER CHAIR

Snow on the Mountain - *Euphorbia marginata* (pictured above) is an annual herb that likes dry soil and grasslands. It grows up to three feet tall and has a milky juice when cut.

The basal leaves are solid green and rounded the upper leaves are pointed and smaller with white margins. There are many small, white flowers with five petals.

It blooms from June to October. A specimen was collected by William Clark on July 28, 1906 in Rosebud County, Montana along the Yellowstone River (*pictured above right*).

LANDSCAPE DESIGN SCHOOL

Thumb R Green Garden Club of Billings hosted Landscape Design School Course 1 which was held in Billings on September 11 and 12, 2020. Barbara Lien, who is a member of the Whitehall Garden Club and has a degree in landscape architecture was the instructor and did an excellent job. Topics included: learning about your ecosystem; space, design and people; Principles and elements of landscape; developing your garden plan, basics of a site plan; color in landscape; design for the environment; development of a landscape design; landscaping: not just for the desert; and the works of a renowned landscape leader. We enjoyed many great pictures of all types of landscapes. Fifteen students took the course; ten garden club members and 5 master gardeners. *All eight of those taking the exam passed!*

Sue Leferink (*below center*) is currently the only Montana garden club member to have taken all four of the courses and she completed a refresher course this winter in Florida to maintain her status as a consultant. It would be great if we could offer the next three courses and have more of our members become consultants.

A Kid Can Do It



If a 12 year old kid can do it, the thought was that a more experienced much older person could also manage. It is Zoom. This COVID-19 has changed how our garden clubs meet. Knowing that 20% of pandemic deaths in this country that has only 4% of the world's population and that Montana has the third largest cases in the nation per capita, I as a club president could not ethically have the Anaconda Garden Club meet in person for the next few months. In just two days our Deer Lodge County experienced one of the highest pandemic cases per capita in Montana that not only infected hospital staff but a wide swath of essential businesses such as its largest drug store and several regular bar patrons. The very close knit town with less than 9,000 people soon knew someone who was infected, along with it's 3 deceased victims.

For 58 years the club has had a luncheon meeting on the 4th Thursday of the month. And for the first time in over half a century the luncheon had to be abandoned this year because neither face masking nor social distancing could not be maintained for our meetings that typically last for two hours. So the local 121 year landmark library offered a large elegant reading room where masking and distance could be maintained. But then came the October pandemic surge. The club was one of other organizations that realized even this genial venue where they met had to be abandoned.

Yes, there was a sleepless night when the obvious decisions were clearly seen. The savvy Executive Board had been meeting via Zoom for 3 months previous, but for our generally older membership Zoom might be a high hurdle. The first step was for members to have a practice session using Zoom. Yes, for some it was a bumpy road on their first try. But we had three phone volunteers available to guide these members and by the meeting the next day, it went surprisingly well. Still a few minor wrinkles exist. But I expect we will all be experts in a couple months.

My greatest misgiving was a fear of tech incompetence. But that morphed into excitement. Slide and video programs and reports could still be visually presented, no pressed pants now needed, and some could even have a Bloody Mary at home if they so desired. We learned to sign on about 10 minutes early to work out bugs, and are learning to speak one at a time since the program will show on the large central screen the person speaking leaving everyone else in smaller thumbnail screens.









Most pleasurable was working with Phyllis White, Montana's and NGC's non-print chairman, who sets up the link for your members to click on for an almost instant visual connection to everyone else. Phyllis is simply fun and encouraging to work with.

Email Phyllis **gardens@bresnan.com** to keep your club active and relevant in this pandemic period. After the virus is under control with widespread vaccination, we will not be in the same place we were at before the pandemic. So consider getting a head start on your future.

You will need decent internet access, and some type of computer, tablet or smart phone to use Zoom, But your MFGC has made the program available for FREE to continue on with your meetings. *Make your challenge a pleasant opportunity.*

- ❖ You garden club president or secretary should send a request to Phyllis White at her email: gardens@bresnan.net with the date and time you wish to meet. No two meetings may take place at one time. Your meeting may have up to 100 attendees and as a courtesy to other clubs should only last about two hours. The sooner you request the date, the more likely it will be available.
- ❖ Phyllis will reserve that time for you and send you an invitation with all the information for joining the meeting. The club president or member who asked for the meeting should send the Zoom meeting invitation to the club members via email. For security, the invitation link should not be published in the paper or any other public area, such as on posters or Facebook pages. There is a link to the meeting in the invitation that once clicked, automatically takes the member to the meeting. The meeting is chaired by the president, or in the case of a committee, by the committee chairman.
- Each club may want to run a practice Zoom meeting. Send Phyllis the meeting time and date and work through the bugs and questions from your members. Members should practice turning on their video and microphone so they can see and hear each other. It's fun to see friends schedule time before the start of the official meeting for your members to network about how they're doing!

RAINBOW GARDEN CLUB AWARDED ENDOWMENT GRANT



Rainbow Garden Club in Great Falls was awarded a \$500 Endowment Grant from MFGC at the Annual Meeting/Fall Board Meeting in Bozeman on October 10, 2020. Rainbow GC applied for the grant to help them with their new project for a Sensory Garden in the Kid's Garden located on the city's west side. The garden will feature plants and activity centers designed for special needs children and adults to experience the five senses of sight, smell, sound, taste and touch. HOW OWLS USE THEIR UNIQUE ADAPTATIONS AFTER DARK

Whether they are in dense woods or in a suburban yard, owls use their unique and spectacular abilities to master their environment. All their senses come together to help them thrive when most animals are sound asleep.

Take one look at an owl and you can see why vision is one of its sharpest senses. Their eyes are so large that they're fixed in the eye sockets for support, so owls can't move their eyes more than a degree of two. To compensate for that limited eye motion, owls are able to turn their heads 270 degrees. Owls also see a different range of colors than other birds or people. They have an abundance of receptors in their eyes called rods, which help pick up light levels, and fewer cones, which are used to detect colors. The trade-off allows them to see prey and avoid obstacles in the dark.

Owls have two advantages in low light: They have excellent skills and adaptations to hear rustling leaves and snapping twigs, and they have the ability to fly almost without making a sound. Listening plays a huge part in hunting. They bob their heads up and down while trying to hear in a behavior called triangulation. They move their ears to home in on where the sound is coming f rom. Several species even have one ear that sits higher than the other. Having asymmetric ears helps them localize the sound vertically. Once they're ready to swoop in, they do so with very little noise. Their wings are lined with fine, comb-like fringes that dampen the flapping sound most birds' wings make, letting them glide silently.

Most birds have a poorly developed sense of taste and smell and the same is true for owls. While it may seem like a big disadvantage not be able to smell, great horned owls benefit from this dulled sense. They do not have a lot of sensory recep tors in their nasal passages, but, this is good since they primarily feed on skunks!

Large owls have a taste strictly for meat and eat a variety of animals from small rodents such as mice, rabbits and skunks up to birds as large as ptarmigans. Fledgling owls that are still learning how to use their impressive abilities start out with smaller prey and hone their skills by going after bugs.

Once owls lock their eyes and ears on prey, one last fantastic asset comes into play. Unlike most hawks and eagles, owls have a fourth opposable toe. Its range of motion is similar to that of a human thumb. It can move to the front or back of the foot to help owls snatch prey, perch on a lime or move within their nests.







DON'T FORGET TO FEED THE BIRDS THIS WINTER! Be sure to put food out in your

yards for the birds this winter. There are many ways to make your own bird food and even feeders, and there are even more types and kinds available commercially in stores or online. **Also, if you are feeding birds don't forget that they also need water**. A heated dog bowl works well and can be purchased from any of the local hardware or livestock retailers.
